Prelude Music for a Marriage Ceremony

The prelude is the segment of a marriage ceremony that provides a suspense to the upcoming event.

As the guests arrive, and last minute decorations, positions, roles and lines are finalised, music is played surreptitiously in the background. Since the music is played before the bride (and her bridal party) arrives at the ceremony, the music chosen for the Prelude should be both suspenseful, subtle, and welcoming.

Processional Music for a Wedding Ceremony

The processional is the segment of a marriage ceremony just after the bride and her bridal party arrive at the ceremony, and begin their 'walk down the aisle'.

As the guests stand to welcome the bride to her marriage ceremony, grand music should be played to signify the event. Often music in this section is performed 'live', however it also may be provided on CD, SD, USB or iPod. Below is a list of music ideas for the bridal party processional:

The music during the processional should be grand and triumphant, and set the scene for both the rest of the celebrant, and the future of the bride and groom.

Finale Music for a Wedding Ceremony

After the bride and groom have said thank-you to all their beloved guests, they will usually stay at the ceremony briefly for photos to be taken.

This segment (immediately following the recessional) is known as the finale. The music played should be subtle background style music, with a triumphant nuance.

As the guests mingle in readiness for the reception, and the bride and groom have their final photos taken at the ceremony, the music played during the finale will signify hope, union and a new beginning.
